But when she started composing her own music, she learned to love the feel of the keys and now she can't stop playing. "It's like breathing," she says. Jennifer Peterson has developed a loyal following in the Midwest. She has taken the stage at a variety of Chicago venues, such as Schuba's, the Abbey, Martyr's, and the Chicago Cultural Center.
