The fifteen track album includes only one cover, Chris Isaak's "Wicked Game" (which Chris and his Los Angeles office love - being released as a single on 10th May and already playlisted as "Single of the Week" on several BBC regional radio stations) and fourteen self penned songs. She co/wrote five of the songs with long term co/writing partner Randy Bachman of Bachman Turner Overdrive and Guess Who fame. Of that collaboration she says: "When Randy first came to my studio to write, about seven years ago I was so excited. "You Ain't Seen Nothin' Yet" had been a huge favourite of mine as a kid, and I got him to perform it solo for me - right there in the studio - it was a blast!" . They found a definite creative connection and have written numerous songs together including "In Blue" the first single to radio from Randy's new album "Jazzthing". "Modern Woman" also has a strong jazz influence. "Jazz was something I grew up with. My parents were always playing Frank Sinatra, Sarah Vaughan, Ella, and it kinda gets in there, though I was into rock and blues - Steely Dan, The Eagles, Bonnie Raitt - but it's all in the mix." The album's producer and another co-writer, Charles Foskett, had originally decided to make an album along the lines of the Buena Vista Social Club, but rather than old Cuban musicians he wanted to create new works for some of the greats of the British jazz scene of the 50's and 60's. He asked Lauren if she fancied writing for the project and they duly made some demos

which they took along to Universal Classics and Jazz label for feedback. "The MD there, Bill Holland, loved the songs and particularly the voice and suggested we make an album with me - so we did." At that point the writing started in earnest. " It feels like Kismet. Everything seemed to come at the right time. Emotionally I needed to do this album, and the songs speak to so many people because they're about life. I've called it my mid-life crisis and everyone I talk to is either having one, about to have one or has just had one!" ------ Lauren started her career as an actor and trod the boards for a few years before finding her real vocation in singing. Her versatile voice put her in great demand as a session singer for many top artists including Cliff Richard, Elvis Costello, John Farnham and many others. She fronted several of her own bands but over the last few years has concentrated on writing whilst raising a young family. As well as Randy, she has been writing with Peter Callander, Amy Powers (Sunset Boulevard, Barbra Streisand) and is about to do some sessions with Chris Difford (Squeeze) and also slated to write a male / female duet with 1m Universal signing jazz singer Jamie Cullum. Now, however, she is eager to get out on the road again and start gigging. "I have a great band of fabulous musicians and I really can't wait to get out there, playing the gigs and doing the promo." The album features Randy Bachman on guitar, as well as famous jazz guitarist Jim Mullen. Bass player Gavin Scott, Clark Tracey and Alun Harries are two of the name drummers featured and the leader single includes an extended track from the album featuring the wonderful bottleneck blues licks of ex-Rolling Stones guitarist Mick Taylor. ----- The album launch took place at the 606 Club in Lots Road, Chelsea to a packed house of music industry, television and radio executives, along with representatives of the press. Lauren performed two storming sets with her band and garnered huge admiration from everyone present. Stuart Epps (producer for Elton John / Robbie Williams / and many others) instantly offered his services for co-producing Lauren's next album. ------ Radio 2 producer Paul Ging promised scheduled plays for the single and true to his word the station has already started playing tracks from the album "The Story of Us" - described as "An Exquisite Tune" by presenter Mathew Wright. ------ Lauren has interviews on BBC Radio 2's Richard Allinson Show, BBC Radio Suffolk, BBC Radio Berkshire, BBC Radio Greater Manchester, Radio Bristol, BBC Radio Jersey and BBC Radio Cornwall are playing "Wicked Game" as "Single of the Week". Lauren is also a guest on The Mike Mendoza Show on LBC. Regional radio stations all over the UK are lining up to interview her and have both playlisted and are playing the extended "Wicked Game" single as "Single of the Week"

Record Producer Charles Foskett is in the initial stages of developing an album and singles for "4 Poofs and a Piano" - "4 Poofs and a Piano" feature regularly each week on BBC's "The Jonathan Ross Show". Charles will encompass various name guest singers who are fans of the Poofs into the record - Sir Elton John has already said he'd like to make it "5 Poofs and 2 Pianos" - Will Young, and various others will probably be lined up to guest on the album. Singer / Songwriter Lauren Field will be co/writing with long-term song writing partner Randy Bachman (Bachman Turner Overdrive / The Guess Who) who will be arriving in London with fellow rock legend and longtime friend Neil Young and his wife Peggy. World class singer songwriters Randy Bachman, Lauren Field, Graham Gouldman, Dennis Locorriere and Polly Polusma appeared at London's Bloomsbury Theatre on Sunday 13th June 2004 in a Gala evening of classic songs to aid the Teenage Cancer Trust. The evening was a huge success all around and Lauren Field was offered the oppourtunity to headline an evening with her band at London's Royal Albert Hall. Lauren Field brought the house down when she performed songs from her debut album "MODERN WOMAN" and also her new single "WICKED GAME" (already single of the week on many regional stations) released through Shmusicmusic Records / BMG on Monday 10th May 2004. Her backing band on this occasion also featured Randy Bachman on guitar. Lauren also helped Randy perform his Hits "You Aint Seen Nothing Yet" - she also co/wrote for his recent single "In Blue" from his highly acclaimed jazz album "JAZZTHING" (Maximum Jazz Records / Canada) After the show Shmusicmusic also clenched a considerable licensing deal for Lauren's "Modern Woman" album and singles to be licensed throughout Germany, Switzerland, Austria, and The Benelux countries with ZYX Records/Germany. They will rush release "Wicked Game" as a summer hit throughout all these territories and get the album out there at the same time. ------ (3). -------------Blues Matters! Issue 20 - Live Gig reviews by Pete Sergeant LAUREN FIELD Dean Street Jazz Club - Soho - May 2004 Jazz clubs aren't this writer's natural habitat. This gig, set below the Pizza Express in deepest Soho provides a Sunday night venue for the very alluring Ms Field and her slightly amended line-up, speaking of which much of the cohesive feel and bursts of energy peppering this performance are down to drummer Alun Harries. In our original interview piece on Lauren she duly acknowledged his skills and effort. The hallmarks of this establishment are a cosy atmosphere, pretty good views wherever you choose to be, excellent service, a great live sound, mostly monied audience, interesting bill of acts to come (including Jacqui Dankworth, funk saxman Eddie M, The Electric Underground Orchestra, Mike Carr with his Blue Note incarnation) and a pre-show playlist that varies between the beguiling and the unlistenable. Field opens with 'Body Double' and then rolls through 'Teamwork', fluid acoustic guitars to the fore. Neil Anguilly's keyboard work is mainly piano, a tasty, less busy Bruce Hornsby in style plus occasional accordion. The two guitarists work well especially on the version of 'This Is My Truth' a co-write with of all people Randy Bachman ('Nice work, mate!') of BTO renown. But the focal point throughout the show is the forceful singing of Lauren Field, at best easily within Janis Ian territory on 'Bring On The Rain' and the shuffling 'Havana', which has the bonus of Steve Waterman on flugelhorn. There is something of Donald Byrd about this man's playing and commenting thus later causes no bad reaction from him. When Field, whose between-song comments hint at a nervousness that is never present in the actual performances, chooses to cover a song (her new single release) 'Wicked Game' she always makes it special and something of her own. Tonight she gives us a cool 'Baby Now That I've Found You' and then better still an aching reading of 'I Can't Make You Love Me', a song that Bonnie Raitt sings exquisitely but after this showing she'll never own 100 again. In a week when London's Evening Standard reported Norah Jones' anger that a front row punter at one of her capital shows was fast asleep (something to do with the material and pacing perhaps ?) I can vouch that no one here or any other Lauren Field gig could ever be spotted with their face in their Marguerita. thing's for sure : BM: Are you excited about this record then ? LF: Very! We've all worked very hard and it's all culminating now in the launch of the album, so yes - very excited! BM: And here we are at the 606 Club which has a jazz flavour of course..is this the right place for you or do you think, you're more rock, folk, whatever.. LF: No I don't think I'm rock or folk..I'm definitely 'crossover'..vou're right in that I'm certainly not 'jazz' as far as say purists are concerned, but there's a lot of jazz influence in what I do and the musicians we're playing with and make up my band do perform here on a regular basis, so they're well-known at the Club. So all that means I'm happy to play here and this makes it the venue for me, I think. BM: Now I've listened to the record guite closely. There's no obvious modelling on any one artist but do you have any real favourites? LF: (Warmly) I LOVE Bonnie Raitt though my stuff is not overall as blues/rock as hers..we may do one Raitt cover tonight, we'll see how it goes. I have so many influences that are eclectic..and if you really listen you might hear them I suppose or they all melt together to create something new, of mine. And I love Jennifer Holiday, a singer with real soul..though you may not hear that (outright) in my singing, I just love her records BM: Nobody wants to be The New anything or anybody..there are a couple of influences I detect, conscious or not! Are you a Bill Withers fan ? LF : Not 'a fan' but I do like his songs.. We speak about Dinah Washington and Basia, who pulled together many strands of music, not least Latin rhythms BM: It's definitely 'night music' isn't it? LF: (Emphatically) Yes it is that kind of mellow. And it's a woman's album...I don't know, maybe because I wrote the lyrics and I'm a woman.. a lot of women do relate to the stories in the songs BM: Now - 'The Story Of Us', the single..it's a very catchy number and it draws you in, sort of like Chapter One of a novel LF: I suppose so, I guess it is. And there is a lot in there that is autobiographical BM: There's very languid rhythm guitar on the following track and by then the overall sound of the record is beginning to evolve..'Modern Woman' itself, it's bosa nova isn't it? LF: Yeah, true BM: Alun Harries is a bit of a star drummer! He is totally in sympathy with the mood of each song LF: (Sighs) That's why he's here in the band tonight BM: The other thing I like is the 3/4 intro on 'So Cold', with the trumpet..I'm risking offence but it's almost like torch songs without the melodrama LF: Definitely! Yes! BM: 'Body Double' is more Maria Muldaurish in tempo, with the walking bass, bluesy guitar LF : It reminded me of a sort of cross between Bonnie Raitt and Shania Twain BM: In a way I think that should have been the opening track on the CD... it seems to have your own personality strongly present..er, as I perceive it LF: (Smiles) Funnily enough, we're starting with that one tonight.. BM: 'Sentimental Trio' has a great late night bar vibe AND it features one of my heroes, guitarist extraordinaire

Jim Mullen (Scottish axeman who picks at a tele with his thumb to get a CTI era sound - PS) LF: (Enthusiastic) He plays on about seven tracks on the album ...(Lauren's admiration of this guitarist shines out of her. I momentarily consider growing a beard - PS) BM: 'The Worm Has Turned' - there's a great line in there about throwing letters into the shredder and I like muted trumpet. I wrote down 'Is this the heart of the record?' LF: It probably is..it's about a woman making changes in her life, to be the person she wants to be. I actually wrote that one a few years ago (Lauren relates how she saw a newspaper story about a cheated woman who stood up for herself, cut up her partner's clothes. Hope he was out of them at the time - PS) BM: Then on 'Team Work' you suddenly sound very vulnerable again..the most poetic song on this set to me is 'Bring On The Rain' LF: I don't even know where that came from (ie what inspired her, precisely - PS) but yes I just love that song! We discuss 'Gimme Some Space', though Lauren is not familiar with Terry Callier whose mood this number recalls ; I explain Jim Mullen's involvement with the US songsmith, especially on 'Timepeace' BM: 'Wicked Game' is fine because you eschew the Hank Marvin guitar in the Isaak version to get your own way of performing it. I enjoyed that a lot as it wasn't 'the obvious thing' LF: Oh thank you! BM: On 'The Woman I Want To Be' I felt the backing was somewhat held back, needed to be stronger for the song LF: (Ponders) We did rework that a number of times, to get to where we felt comfortable with it. BM: How did you get Mick Taylor to do the slide on the single's version of the 'Can't Do This Anymore' song? Quite a coup! LF: We asked him and he liked the song a lot so he just did what you hear on there, wonderful We speak briefly about Carla Olsen's 'Ring Of Truth' album, where Mick Taylor is all over the place with his best playing in years BM: Although this is a 'latenight' record, you've not got a sax player on there! A cliche avoided? LF : Well we thought the trumpet was better for these songs...and the guitars A curious thing : if you enter 'Lauren Field' on Google some of the entries are about a totally unrelated US female footballer! I show Field the copy - this American Lauren has scored four goals in a big match) BM: (Affecting D Telegraph voice) Well of course the key to getting these interviews working is to do your research properly - so how did you manage to score four goals in Waco? LF: (Deadpan) It's amazing isn't it ? Just another of my many talents. You've done a very good job... Lauren explains that they are starting to write songs for the follow-up album. She thinks for the current album that everything came about at the right time, personally, musically. It sounds like it. For a moment we speak families and then tonight's band. The latter includes drummer Harries, keys/accordion man Pete Rosser, Andy Jones on electric, Tristan Seume on acoustic, Gavin Scott on

double bass. Plus I think Mark Armstrong on trumpet and he is excellent. Lauren plays keyboards sometimes and will for one solo song tonight. The show itself is a two-set job, they include the Isaak cover and also Bonnie's 'A Thing Called Love' as first encore. The band are tight, cool, quietly muscular. None of them tread on the vocal lines, solo's are airy, measured. Field herself has a excellent live voice, losing herself in her own favourites, she features the players throughout, manages to look composed even by the very end of the second set. I think we have a welcome talent here, with a warmth that other similarly competent performers cannot always muster..this is the sound of a great night out and on record, an even better one in.
