
Mp3 Steve Coffey & The Lokels - East Of East Coulee

As what they called "A musical fishin' trip" East of East Coulee was recorded in an old coalmining schoolroom over a winter weekend in, where else? East Coulee, Alberta. Employing old recording techniques and gut instinct, they believe they captured the true spirit of Steve's songs and of the Canadian prairie landscape. Their goal was a simple weekend jam session which they planned to tape for their own enjoyment. Later, when Coffey played the tapes, he realized this record had to come out. His instincts were dead on. East of East Coulee is one of the warmest, most sincere country-folk records of the year. Standouts include the catchy stomp 'n' pick tunes My Hitchin' Ass, Stanley's Hope, and Watchin' Daddy Dance. As for the ghostly steel guitar ballad, Face

in The Steel, a crackly old recording made by Coffey's father, Bill Coffey, more than 40 years ago, it'll send a shiver up your spine and a tear down your cheek."
