Erlendson tells about her revelations. The text is chatty ("I looked up and there you were/ Choose your companions wisely"). The songs are genre catchers, like the Bee Gees at the Carnival-esque crooning in Shine a Light, or Lilac Festival, featuring a snarl bitch Sleater-Kinny riff on acoustic guitar. As the daughter of jazz legend Bob Erlendson, daughter Jessica's lifetime of musical immersion has taught her how to wake up an old style and make it dance. With influences ranging from Stevie Wonder to Joni Mitchell, Erlendson's songs frame lyric arguments in solid grooves. The arrangements are lush, dripping with extra percussive and vocal touches, including some of the best backup vocals in recent Canadian indie recording history. Every tune is an evocation of personal
