But there are those among us whose libido may have fixated on a more, shall we say, darker form of intimacy. Like the power of nature-that's what we're talking about-like the feeling you get during a thunderstorm. Trying to describe this music is like trying to describe the bondage / domination experience. Most people wouldn't get it, though they may want to experience the excitement. They might know how it feels to be driving alone on a stormy night when their car's engine dies. Here's how one listener put it into words: "Around the fourth piece on this album I started to feel frightened. There is fear perceived in this music, not necessarily my fear, but fear none the less. Like the fear you feel when a character in a movie doesn't know that someone is behind them holding a knife. "It made me feel as if I had gone into my basement at night and the lights went out. Or the feeling you might have when you think someone is watching you. Or maybe like I'd feel if I were at home by myself, taking a bath, and heard someone come through the front door. The apprehension created by this music is palpable, just like the

apprehension one might have being restrained and at the whim of another person's pleasure. "But it also seemed to stimulate a philosophical mood that was reflective and thoughtful. There is a definite purpose to this music. It motivates my shadow to move to the forefront of my psyche. It is a lesson for all of us in how to lose our inhibitions, better than Prozac ever could. It might be a key that unlocks buried desires." This album is a highly stylized and unique tone poem. It's not the kind of thing you'd listen to for enjoyment. It is the soundtrack to sin.

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
