Dept. of Energy is an indie-rock trio formed out of the remains of two of Seattles favorite local bands: Dear John Letters and Ego Band USA. Although major commercial success eluded both of these local acts, critical praise did not: Centered around multi-instrumentalist and songwriter Robb Benson, Dear John Letters' third full-length album establishes the band as an ever more unique force in American indie rock." -Stein Haukland (Ink19.com) Note: Dear John Letters final recording Stories of Our Lives reached a high of #34 on the CMJ (College Music Journal) charts. Ego Band USA was named the unsigned band of the month in Keyboard Magazine. (Note: Ty Bailies playing was described by Keyboard magazine as a keyboard purists delight). Dept. of Energy is fronted by Robb Benson (singer/ songwriter Dear John Letters, Nevada Bachelors), and features the musical talents of Ty Bailie (keyboards, organ Ego Band USA) and Cassady Laton (drums Dear John Letters). The combination of Bensons trademark pop sensibilities, Bailies all around musicianship, and Cassadys inspired rhythm arrangements have already caused a stir in the local Seattle scene. This may be the first time youre hearing of them, but not likely the last. The first release from Dept. of Energy is a self titled EP. The recording took place over a weekend with Benson, Bailie, and Laton creating the music together and Johnny Sangster producing (Sangster has worked with such acts as the Posies and Mudhoney). Lyrics were penned by both Benson

Energy is a local outfit featuring members of Dear John Letters and Ego Band USA. Their piano-heavy pop at times recalls Harvey Danger, but then they make their sound turn a little more vintage with a strong Beatles influence shining through, especially on "One Last Wish for Claire Grogan" from their self-titled EP on Roam Records. Overall, their music offers simple and clean pop, perfect for the warmer days. Instead of returning to his solo sets, Benson decided to form a new band with Ty (Bailie) and Cassady (Laton). They call themselves Dept. of Energy. Three men, no bassist, one hell of an act.
