That song, as well as Home Coming, and Save Me, O God, also suggest Tomomis Japanese roots with their melodies. Home Coming is, hands down, Tomomis best vocal performance on the CD. The piano is complex, the effect is nostalgic. Save Me, O God is built of mournful Psalms. The intensity builds as the songs progress. There is a synthesizer bridge that sounds distinctly Asian. The influence of Tomomis association with her private jazz piano teacher Dr. Rich Ripani and the Nashville Jazz Workshop also shows up on several cuts. God Never Gives Up on Me is full of jazz riffs and has a lounge sound, while Lord, I Want to Be a Christian is upbeat jazz: an altar call song.
