She recently graduated from Barnard College. While there she wrote "The Words Of Every Song", a novel which was released this summer ('07) by Random House and subsequently received many glowing reviews; being chosen by Borders as one of its featured "new authors" releases and also given a three and a half out of four star review by People Magazine. Her music is in the folk/rock genre with a "literary" aura. She has played at the Hudson River Museum as part of their Women in Music series and was selected as a New Artist at the renowned three-day GottaGetGon Festival in upstate New York in 2004. Once leader of her own quartet, the Liz Moore Band, she currently plays solo and has just finished a set of recordings with producer Rob Galbraith. She lives in Brooklyn.
