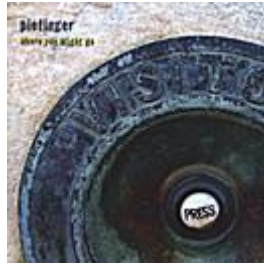


# Mp3 Piefinger - Where You Might Go

Genre-bending 'countryfolkharmoniypop' - perhaps. "Sort of upbeat and deep at the same time." Acoustic guitars, 3way harmonies, violin, Rickenbacker bass and intelligent percussion have made this band "one of London's more absorbing acoustic acts..." 13 MP3 Songs POP: Folky Pop, COUNTRY: Country Folk Details: This is the way acoustic music is going (Acoustic Routes, Cambridge 2005) One of Londons more absorbing acoustic acts, this countryfolk harmony band deliver a unique blend of poetic lyrics, intriguing melodies and three-part harmonies with their first studio album 'Where you might go.' The band have been pulling large and excitable crowds to their London shows for the last couple of years, says Rich Barnard in his EP review for Acoustic Music website, the Virtually Acoustic Club (thevac). With their mixture of wry lyrics, infectious violin pizzicato and a trademark slow build-crescendo-aftershock arrangement, their vocal harmony and counterpoint often scrapes the genius of the Indigo Girls inspired interplays. The band formed initially as a duo in Vienna when acoustic singer-songwriter Glynne Steele met vocalist Jana Carpenter whilst working at the English Theatre. In the subsequent four years, the band has steadily evolved into a dynamic and original five-piece with the addition of classical violinist Rachel Steadman, singer-songwriter David Sherwood on bass and Ben Woollacott, formerly of The Veils, on percussion. The band have previously released two EPs under their own label, Here inside the night (2004) and Time alone (2005) - both of which are still available via the band's website piefinger - and, after their first UK National Tour, began work on their first studio album 'Where you might go', now available for the first time on CDBaby. Whats most impressive is that Piefinger refuse to take refuge in the lush array of sounds they are able to make, continues Barnard. There are no duff lyrics swept under gorgeous vocal scrunches or flashy string runs, although both of the latter are on offer in the right places. The bands official website - piefinger - lists all upcoming gigs, plus a gallery of pictures and a guestbook

where fans can leave messages. The Music section of the site includes full quality extracts from the two EPs as well as the new album.
